Here at Software Heritage, we are fully committed to building an open, shared, non-profit, multistakeholder infrastructure that collects, preserves, and makes easily accessible the source code of all publicly available software.

We understand the importance of welcoming users and supporting their diverse needs. Whether you are an individual developer or a larger organization seeking to protect and share software source code that you care about, we are here to help. After the FAQ_page, a web page is now specifically dedicated to detailing what is available for the users, and we have released a browser extension that allows to seamlessly check the status of, or trigger the archival of public projects hosted on one of the many popular code hosting platforms or technologies. A two-day international workshop has brought together over 100 participants to discuss landmark legacy software preservation. And on February 7th 2023, during the upcoming annual Software Heritage Symposium and Summit, we'll hear from a broad spectrum of stakeholders, ranging from cultural heritage to public administration, and from industry to research.

Our long-term mission is a humbling one: we'll only succeed with the help of a large community, and we are grateful for the growing number of ambassadors who show up to spread the word.



Despite the health crisis we have been experiencing since March 2020, Software Heritage pursues its mission of collecting, preserving and sharing software source code, which started many years ago and

The archive is growing steadily, counting now over 11 billion unique source files from more than 170 million projects, from a growing number of origins: we are grateful to the volunteers that submitted over 100.000 Save Code Now requests, and to the many expert contributors that helped expand the coverage of the archive (more on this in the annual report).

We will continue to expand the international community around Software Heritage: collecting, preserving and sharing all the software source code is a humbling undertaking that

requires institutional support, with sponsors and partners (take a look at the different sponsorship program possibilities), as well as individual engagement, ranging from collaborators to contributors, from ambassadors to the donors that are answering the call of the ongoing end of year fundraising campaign (yes, you should join too!).

We look forward to working with all interested parties: let's work together to preserve our past, improve our present, and prepare a better future.
